JOTTINGS FROM A COUNTRY CHURCHYARD

WELL, HERE WE ARE in September, traditionally towards the end of summer. I hope everyone has found enjoyment during our odd one-day-at-a-time summer. It seems as though we must just accept now that our summers consist of the odd brief heatwave between torrential and rains and often constantly cold north east winds.

In spite of (or because of?) the variable weather flowers have flowered and tree and shrubs have blossomed so that abundance of autumn seeds and fruits should be around for wildlife (and humans) to gather. And, oddly, most things have peaked earlier than usual – perhaps owing to the mild winter giving them an early start? But flora and fauna seem increasingly out of sync. Because of cold, wet conditions insect life was scarce when insect eating birds such as swifts and swallows needed flying food and blue tits etc needed aphids and caterpillars so that many early broods failed.

Butterflies, too, I have found scarce until the past couple of weeks when they now seem to be in abundance, just too late for th National Butterfly Count. But, as with other mistimings, my buddleias are almost over. Just a few tattered and frayed

fronds of fading flowers (whoops! How's that for alliteration?) are clustered with greedily feeding butterflies.

Bumble beeds seem to be fewer too. Iusually have to rescue several huge furry ones daily in my bug-sucker (wonderful device from Lakeland, gentle, harmless and saves a lot of climbing). But tis summer I have had perhaps two per week. Wasps, I am not keen on – too quick in speed and temper – but they do as valuable job of pollinating as bees, so I tolerate them. At the moment, I have a huge – and growing daily! – nest in the rafters of my store-room next to the garden shed. Also we have on in the churchyard grass which meant we had to re-locate a social gathering planned there to celebrate the completion of our new heating, lighting, carpeting and pew cushioning in the church.

Anyone reading this who has not yet seen our newly transformed Chantry church, do please come and look. The church is open every day and there is a service every Sunday to which you will be warmly welcomed and plied with coffee and cake afterwards. Only on the first Sunday of each month the services rotate around the four churches so see the magazine (that sounds like a spinning congregation, but you know what I mean!).

I was speaking the other day to someone after church who was dreading a session with her dentist, so I encouraged her by passing on my antidote for undergoing any unpleasant procedure. I just imagine I am lying in a field of buttercups and wild flowers, listening to the larks singing high above, bumble bees floating over and grasshoppers creaking all around. If so, do tell me where and I'll go and have a listen and recall my long absence.

Still, mustn't grumble. At the moment, I am sitting in the stable yard on one of our "proper" summer days, drowsed by the heady lemony perfume of several huge magnolia grandiflora flowers, newly opened. The sky is cornflower blue, flecked with just a few slowly drifting chalk scribbles and, the sun being really hot, I am relishing the shade of my jungly garden. I am used to its jungly state and so are all my friends but town living cousins visiting recently suggested helpfully that the next time they came, the man of the party would willingly cut back the greenery on my path, assuming it was too hard for me to do. They seemed puzzled when I ex-pla9ined that I preferred to be hidden away and anyway, being only 4'8" tall, I mostly walked under anything overhanging. And any visiting friends who got flicked by leaves or twigs either brushed them aside or snapped them off in passing if they found them a nuisance.

I did have a surprise is my orchard a few weeks ago. When the campion and queen Anne's lace were waist high prior to its summer strimming I stopped to retrieve a useful forked branch from a pile of brushwood and out leapt what I thought was a large rabbit. A friend with me recognised it as baby muntjac deer, probably left by its mother to hide my quiet orchard, possibly having given birth to it there. I avoided the orchard for a few weeks but when I did go down there

Our drivers are happy to wait for you to finish your appointment before bringing you home.



WHATLEY QUARRY OPENS DOORS TO BIODIVERSITY PARTICICPANTS

Heidelberg Materials' Whatley quarry is opening its doors to participants in the sixth round of the company's Quarry Life Award, its biodiversity research competition. Participants from more than 15 countries worldwide can pitch their project ideas for sustainable quarry management and compete for prizes totalling €300,000 (approx. £250,000).





The Quarry Life Award was first established in 2011 to support and increase biodiversity at quarry sites, strengthen communication channels with neighbours and educate and raise awareness about the importance of nature and habitats. The award has since received more than 1,500 submissions and has generated over 450 innovative project ideas to promote and protect biodiversity.

Kyle Smith, Unit Manager at Whatley quarry, said: "The protection and enhancement of biodiversity is a key part of our sustainability strategy, so our aim is to encourage projects that can support the work we are already doing to improve biodiversity and the quality of restoration at our sites.

"We would also like to hear from people who have ideas which will create a better understanding of the importance of quarrying and its vital role in constructing and maintaining the built environment like our homes, schools, roads and hospitals.

"The Quarry Life Award aligns with our 2030 commitment to build a nature positive future and, by increasing dialogue with academics, NGOs and our local communities, is helping to inform the development of biodiversity action plans at all our sites."

At a national level, projects can be carried out in either the 'research' or 'community' streams, both of which offer a £4,000 top prize.

The research stream focuses on scientific projects that increase knowledge of quarry-specific ecology and/or lead to improved biodiversity, landscape, or water management while the

community stream is for projects that help the quarry to better connect with its neighbours and raise awareness among the wider public of the biodiversity at extraction sites.

National winners will advance to the international stage of the competition, with prizes awarded in the following categories: biodiversity management, habitat and species, beyond quarry borders, biodiversity and education, connecting quarries and communities, and nature-based solutions. The best projects in each of the six categories will be rewarded with a prize of &10,000 (approx. £8,400) each. The best project overall will receive no less than &30,000 (approx. £25,300) in total.

Project proposals based at Whatley Quarry are invited to be submitted on the Quarry Life Award website by November 18th 2024. A panel of experts will then select six of the proposals to become projects to be carried out between January and September 2025.

'BUS IT' THIS SEPTEMBER

September is an important month for bus users and for all those thinking of switching to going by bus. September is "Catch the Bus Month".

Also in Somerset, September is one of the only two opportunities in the year

that bus companies can change their bus timetable, so bus operators have been looking at their schedules, checking their passenger numbers. Some will have made changes from September 1st to optimise their returns.

So, if you can go online, do check your local bus routes to see what your bus times are from September 1st. The best way of doing this is to go to www.bustimes.org, put in the number of your local bus route and bus times for your local stop will appear. Somerset Bus Partnership has also listed all the bus services which will change in September including a link to the new timetables: somersetbuspartnership.co.uk/busservices.

Given the financial emergency declared by Somerset Council, Somerset hasn't the money to increase its funding of buses so the best way of ensuring you keep your local buses is to BUS IT whenever you can... especially this month as it's Catch the Bus Month!

By supporting your local bus services whenever you can, you're playing your part in ensuring there are buses for those in your local community, young and old, who don't drive or don't have access to a car, hence are dependent on buses. Transport accounts for 45percent of carbon emissions in Somerset, so you can reduce your environmental impact if you travel by bus. It's good for your pocket too, as a single bus fare costs just £2 or less and that's guaranteed through to the end of the year.

So BUS IT during September's CATCH THE BUS MONTH!



NOTES OF MELLS PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY AUGUST 13TH 2024 (MELLSPARISHCOUNCIL.ORG.UK) SOMERSET COUNCIL - COUNCILLOR'S REPORT:

Reduction in Council Tax support: Somerset residents are being encouraged to have their say on possible changes to a scheme which offers financial support to working age adults (not pensioners) on low incomes. Options for consideration include reducing the maximum available discount from 100percent to 75percent. More information can be found at somersetcouncil.citizenspace.com/comms/ctr/. The consultation runs until October 1st, with any changes coming into effect from April 1st, 2025. Clerk to write expressing concerns.

Enforcement officers: There are now four officers at Somerset Council who are dealing with more than 1,000 cases. Cases where there is a health and safety issue will be prioritised.



MATTERS ARISING

Barn lease: As the PC does not have a common seal it was agreed that Cllr John Earl and Cllr John Henderson would sign the lease when it is ready.

Pavilion lease and future of recreation ground: The Estate Manager has no issue with the lease being with the company although this is not the directors preferred option. Clerk to request the directors attend the October PC meeting to discuss the way forward.

Quarry noise: The primary works shut down at 11.30pm and re-open at 6.00am. It is the movement of stock at night to load onto the trains which appears to be the cause of noise at night.

HIGHWAY AND FOOTPATH ISSUES:

Condition of grass triangle – Bottom Lane and area in front of Vobster Inn: Cllr Turner will look into getting some topsoil raked over the area. The plan is for the grass to be allowed to grow longer near the walled area to encourage wildlife and to have a more formal cut area at the front for picnicking/seating. The memorial tree will be near the wall.

Fast traffic by Claveys Farm & Park Corner: Claveys - Evidence is required of incidences and repeat offenders. Possibility of a speed indicator device, but the PC would have to fund this. Park Corner – reflector panels will be placed behind the give way signs to make them more noticeable, reinstatement of the white lines and the addition of rumble bars will be scheduled.

Traffic on Holes Lane: Highways is looking into this.

Speeding cars through Vobster: Cllr Brady reported that the police will drive through the village at random times during the evening for the next two to three weeks.

White lines – Woodlands End: Highways has forwarded their planned improvements to the white lining etc in this area.

Streetlights – Longfield: Cllr Barry Clarke was asked to assist and now five out of the eight streetlights are working.

PLANNING

2024/1135/FUL: Change use from commercial storage (B8) to residential (use Class C3). Single storey extension & erection of garage – The Engine Shed, Upper Vobster – no objections

CORRESPONDENCE:

Idverde – **grounds maintenance changes:** Somerset Council is looking at moving verge cutting, litter/dog waste bin emptying and other services to be supplied inhouse (from June 2025) so their current contractor (Idverde) is offering to continue the services either as a full asset transfer or on a maintenance agreement.

They currently cut 3128 sq. metres around the village. To await further information from Somerset Council.

Somerset Council – charges for litter and dog waste bin emptying: It is the intention of Somerset Council to charge for every litter/dog waste bin empty from April 2025. The figure of £7.82/per bin lift was mentioned as being what other councils are currently charging although the actual figure is yet to be confirmed. Mells has six dog waste bins (although it is hoped that the two in Fairfield will be classed as one lift) and four litter bins. If all are emptied on a fortnightly basis (at the price above) this is an additional cost of around £1,830 to the parish council which would need to be added to the precept.
